



The siblings of people with autism are growing up and starting their own families. Many have concerns about how their family tree will be influenced by autism. What's the probability that a new baby in these families will be diagnosed? It's important to know.

That's why, in conjunction with Emory University and the University of California at Los Angeles, in partnership with the Baby Siblings Research Consortium, the Autism Science Foundation is launching a new project to understand the perspectives of siblings

The goal of this project is to gather input on how having a sibling with autism affects your perspective of research and plans for your own family.

If you are 18-49 years of age, have a sibling diagnosed with ASD or are the legal spouse of a non-diagnosed sibling, have a sibling with ASD who participated in the clinical program of the Emory Autism Study and have verbal English proficiency, you are eligible to participate in a Focus Group. The conversations will last about 2 hours and you will receive \$25 for your time and input.
